The Virtue of Forgiveness

A part of any serious 12-step recovery is forgiveness.

As I write this, I've been reading about a Hindu man—Samundar Singh—who had brutally murdered a Catholic nun, Sister Rani Maria, in broad daylight while traveling on a bus in Madhya Pradesh, India. She was stabbed 54 times in front of several passengers while being dragged out of the bus and left to die on the roadside. Singh admitted that he was hired to kill the nun on the orders of local landlords who were opposed to her social work for poor farmers. Singh was arrested and given the death sentence, which was subsequently commuted to a life term. After being convicted, his wife walked out on him and their only son died. Singh was eventually freed after serving only 12 years in prison because of a petition signed by Sister Rani Maria's family, the Clarist con-



gregation to which she belonged, and the local Catholic bishop.

While in jail awaiting his release, he was planning to kill the man who enticed him to kill Sister Rani Maria, and then hang himself on a tree. But it was at that time that a Carmelite priest—Father Porattukara—came to visit him in jail. He continued to visit him in jail in subsequent weeks. At the time, Samundar was furious with Jeevan Singh (the man who hired him to kill Sister Rani Maria) because he

failed to ensure his acquittal as promised.

Father Porattukara (known to the Hindus as Swami Sadanand) "made me get over my urge for revenge. He changed my mind," recalled Samundar. Not only that, but three months after their first meeting, Father Porattukara astonished Singh by advising that he would bring Sister Selmy—Sister Rani Maria's younger sister, who was also a Clarist nun—to the jail on the Hindu festival day of Rakhi ("thread"), when "sisters" tie special threads on the hands of "brothers," celebrating their protective bond, regardless of whether they are actual relatives. "I could not believe it—the younger sister of the nun I killed tying rakhi on the hand that stabbed her sister mercilessly. It was on Aug. 22," he remembered, with tears in his eyes.

CELEBRATING AND LIVING THE MESSAGE OF FATIMA

I would like to introduce our readers to two important books on Fatima, by an organization called *Communal First Saturdays*. These books are important in that they summarize the entire Fatima Message and stress the importance of the First Five Saturday devotions with insightful explanations in the context of the entire mystery of Fatima. It is a non-profit organization dedicated to answering the appeal of Jesus to Sr. Lucia of Fatima to spread the First Saturdays devotion in reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The First Saturdays is the one remaining unfulfilled request of the two important requests of Our Lady of the Rosary on July 13, 1917. These requests are an essential part of fulfilling God's wish to establish devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary in the world for the salvation of souls and a period of peace.

FATIMA AND THE FIRST SATURDAYS. This is an important book for those who have read everything about Our Lady of Fatima. Yet, even beginners can find a shortcut to understanding the Fatima message. This is a message that the world needs now more than ever. Yet, many important aspects of the message have been overlooked. In this book passages are quoted in Sr. Lucia's own words and then a commentary is presented on them. Passages covered concern the appearances of the Angel of Peace, Our Lady's six appearances at Fatima, the three important appearances after Fatima, and crucial information related to the First Saturdays found in Sr. Lucia's letters and locutions up to 1945. From beginning to end, the reader will not only learn from Sr. Lucia herself but also will learn through the commentary new and original insights into the contents of the Fatima message. **One will discover the unique importance of the First Saturdays devotion within the context of the entire Fatima message.** This devotion is the only one of Our Lady's two special requests that remains to be fulfilled to help bring about peace in the world and the salvation of souls. Further, this book presents a special way in which the devotion can be propagated in each parish so that a larger number of the faithful can have access to its benefits. In addition, this book will help direct the reader toward the next steps for spreading the First Saturdays. Spreading and fulfilling the First Saturdays is urgently needed as the solution to the world's problems. This solution will lead to the triumph of the Immaculate Heart of Mary.





RECOMMENDATIONS:



ORDER FROM THE 12-STEP REVIEW

August 22 is the feast day of the Queenship of Mary. Regarding this feast, Pope Pius XII noted (*Ad Coeli Reginam*, No. 39):

Mary, too, as mother of the divine Christ, as His associate in the redemption, in His struggle with His enemies and His final victory over them, has a share, though in a limited and analogous way, in His royal dignity. For from her union with Christ she attains a radiant eminence transcending that of any other creature; from her union with Christ she receives the royal right to dispose of the treasures of the Divine Redeemer's Kingdom; from her union with Christ finally is derived the inexhaustible efficacy of her maternal intercession before the Son and His Father.

There are many kinds of alms, the giving of which helps us to obtain pardon for our sins; but none is greater than that by which we forgive from our heart a sin that someone has committed against us.

St. Augustine

Mary's powerful role in "disposing of the treasures" of the Divine Mercy (which we focused on in our last Newsletter) is always at work in our lives as Christians to move us to imitate the love of her Son and to treat our enemies as Jesus treated His. This was her renewed message at Fatima.

In all His words and deeds Jesus revealed God as unrestricted love and mercy. There are no limits to His forgiveness. When the Pharisees drag before Jesus a woman caught in adultery, to stone her to death, Jesus speaks on her behalf, offering forgiveness (John 8:1-11). Even when Judas comes to betray Him, He addresses him as "friend" (Matthew 26:50), and from the Cross Jesus prays for those who spit on Him and drove nails into His hands and feet, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23:34). This is such a wonderful thing that Jesus invites us to do the same. Are we willing to give the grace of forgiveness to a fellow sinner, or will we simply be like the Scribes and Pharisees? Isn't it great hypocrisy for sinners to want to harm other sinners because of sin?

We find the love of Jesus expressed in the lives of Sister Rani Maria's family members who have embraced her murderer with bonds of forgiveness. Now every year, on Raksha Bandhan, the Hindu festival celebrating the love of siblings, Sister Selmy ties a "rakhi" (sacred thread) around Singh's wrist, symbolizing the bond of protection between a brother and a sister. Samundar considers Sister Maria Rani's family as his own. He regularly visits her tomb which, he says, is a "sanctuary of peace and strength."

Catherine McGilvray, an Australian-Italian director who heard of Singh's story from an Indian missionary, said, "I was deeply moved by the images of the mother kissing her daughter's murderer and of the assassin becoming like a real brother to the sister of his victim." And so Ms. McGilvray did a film on this true story, a film which won an award at the World Interfaith Harmony Film Festival in Los Angeles.

Regarding her sister's murderer, Sr. Selmy said when interviewed, "It is immaterial to me if he remains a Hindu or

becomes a member of any other religion. He will continue to be my brother."

On the night before He was betrayed, Jesus took the chalice and said, "This is the cup of My blood which will be shed for you and for many so that sins may be forgiven." Later, when Jesus rises from the dead, He calls His disciples to preach the forgiveness of sins to all nations. The forgiveness of sins by God is central to the mystery of our Christian faith. It is part of our vocation as sons and daughters of our Father to become like God. It is so important that Jesus exhorts us to leave our gift by the altar, go and be reconciled, then come back to the altar. This is part and parcel of the Christian Gospel: to forgive, to be reconciled. It is part of any serious 12-step recovery.

I focus on this theme in this summer's newsletter because, as many of our readers know, back in December of 2015 I was falsely accused of abusing someone. As a result, and following Church protocol, I was removed from ministry and had to cancel my missions and retreats until the issue could be researched. After attempting to get others to join in the lawsuit by having the case reported in the news media (newspapers and TV) both in Oregon and in California (where members of SNAP stood outside both churches after Masses with a large photo of me), they were without success. No one came forward to join in the lawsuit. In addition, my accuser's own family came to my aid, revealing that their brother was lying. The case was finally dropped by my accuser's lawyer, and subsequently by my accuser himself. However, with my name still not cleared, a thorough investigation had to be carried out by an outside investigator. With that investigation done, I was cleared this past June.

What's important about the case from my perspective is that I firmly believe that "God makes all things work together for the good of those who love Him" (Romans 8:28); however, the emphasis is on loving God, and there can be no loving God without living His precepts. The one precept that makes us more Christ-like is the love that offers genuine forgiveness, as Christ did from the Cross.

And so I make an appeal to anyone reading this newsletter to join with me in making an appeal to the Immaculate and Sacred Hearts for special graces for my accuser, that God in His power may use this false accusation to bring about a greater good, not simply for myself, but indeed for my accuser. My thanks to all who will join me in this. ❀

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
